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I. ABOUT THE STUDY



INTERNATIONAL TALENT FINLAND RESEARCH PROJECT



RESEARCH

In the International Talent Finland Research Project, we ask how to attract international talents to work and live in Finland. We look at talent and different talent groups with a solution-oriented approach and from the perspective of resources.

We ask how Finland can become a country that invites, engages, and attracts talent, and where it is easy for an expatriate Finn to return to or a foreigner to come to work. How could people from outside Finland also take part in building the country?

The research project was conducted from October 2021 to March 2023 by E2 Tutkimus (E2 Research), an independent research institute. E2 Tutkimus is a multidisciplinary research institute serving third-sector organisations, businesses, foundations, municipalities, ministries, political decision-makers, and the media.

Survey data


This report is based on a survey that was intended for international students who are studying for a bachelor's or master's degree at Finnish universities or universities of applied sciences.


The survey examined the views of international students on factors attracting international students to Finland, opinions on life and working in Finland, the need for services, and plans for the future.

Respondents (N=600) were international students studying at Finnish universities (72 %) or Finnish universities of applied sciences (27 %).

The survey was conducted anonymously on Webropol and was open to responses between November 1 and 31, 2022. The survey was in English.






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
Receiving a place of study and an overall desire to live in Finland are the main reasons to move to Finland

The quality of higher education, the general standard of living, and closeness to nature attract international students


Which of the following factors do you consider appealing in Finland? (Please choose 1–5 most important factors) (N=600)




Adjusting to life in Finland



Most international students have adjusted well to life in Finland

- The majority of international students have adjusted to life in Finland very (23%) or fairly (63%) well.
- Only 3% feel that they have adjusted very poorly to living in Finland.




Plans after completing studies

- 43% are not likely to move out of Finland after completing their studies






Factors that affect adjustment








A vast majority (86%) think that **learning Finnish or Swedish is** important










Opinions on the quality of studies and study environment

A suitable study program and international study environment main reasons for choosing an educational institution


What were the main reasons behind your decision to choose your current educational institution in Finland? (You can choose more than one option) (N=600)

How satisfied are you with the following things related to living in Finland? (%) (N=600)




Value of diploma/certificate after graduation.



The majority of students are satisfied with their studies in Finland


- Most of the respondents are very (40%) or somewhat (47%) satisfied with their studies in Finland.






Work experience in Finland



More than half have experience of employment or an internship


Which of the following best describes your work experience in Finland? (You can choose more than one option) (N=600)











Thoughts about working life and labour market in Finland






5 NEED FOR SERVICES

III. CONCLUSIONS





Overall international students are satisfied with their life in Finland. The majority of them value the high quality of Finnish higher education. They have adjusted to life in Finland well and they have done so rather quickly. They are regularly in touch with other international students, and more than half have several Finnish friends. Majority of international students are satisfied with their studies in Finland and about half are likely to stay in Finland after graduation.

However, almost half are likely to leave Finland after completing their studies. Reasons behind leaving and things that make adjusting to life in Finland difficult vary from climate and language barrier to difficulties in job markets. There is nothing that can be done about the climate, but there are many things that can be done to make foreign students feel more at home – and support their entry into labour markets. According to students, learning Finnish or Swedish is something that can be expected from people living in Finland permanently. However, some students say that studies are so packed with content that there is no room for learning the language.

Another issue has to do with the labour markets. Approximately two-thirds have gained work experience during their studies. Over half see their career prospects positively, but still almost one in three consider their opportunities to advance their career in Finland as poor.

Over half feel that Finnish labour markets are not equal to all regardless of their background. These are also the people, who are more likely than others to leave after completing their studies. Almost third of the respondents feel that everyone has the same opportunities in the Finnish labour market.





To make international students feel at home and make them stay, several measures need to be taken on different levels. Educational institutions need to adjust their study programs so that there is also room for language studies. Learning the language is the key factor in integration.




Another issue has to do with the labour markets. Contacts between companies and educational institutions need to be strengthened and special focus must be put on finding internship opportunities for foreign students.



Finally, educational institutions should encourage and advance the formation of versatile social networks during international students' studies in Finland. Many have close contacts with other international students, but contacts with Finnish students and friends are fewer. The formation of social networks promotes integration, well-being and employment opportunities.
